Letter from the HEAL Team

Dear Friends,

The last few years have been hard. For everyone, but especially health workers.

HEAL fellows have been through many surges, in many parts of the world. COVID comes on top of a chronic emergency of preventable suffering and death that already existed in communities where HEAL works.

Two things that keep us going as a community and as health workers: We never stop imagining the possibility of health justice for our communities, and we lean on each other again and again in a beloved community. Our fellows create noble friendships across their many differences. Across geography, language, role, rank, and these friendships are an antidote to paralysis or apathy in a deeply unequal world. It is an inoculation against numbing and burning out.

We have lots to celebrate amidst difficult times. We have lots of metrics of success as you can see in our year-end report. We have a number of successes to share in the upcoming pages. HEAL fellows and alumni are staying in the work. They are caring for resource-denied community members. They are leading the charge to building better health programs.

We have always thought of HEAL as a signal of what is possible when those proximate to suffering come together in solidarity to learn together.

Eight years after HEAL began, we are excited to share the rollout of our 2021-26 Strategy. We continue expanding access to transformation programming for health workers, and continue programming closer to communities themselves. We are preparing to launch a monolingual Spanish HEAL program led by our alumni in Chiapas Mexico in early 2023. We are designing a HEAL program within the state of California. We have been able to return to convening in person programming - which kicked off in Malawi, New Mexico, Mexico and California this past summer. Finally, all while maintaining our core two year UCSF fellowship cohorts.

We believe that people coming together can transform systems. And along the way, we have been transformed ourselves. Thank you for being part of this phenomenal journey.

Twenty-two remarkable healthcare professionals graduated from the HEAL fellowship in 2022. This cohort demonstrated extraordinary perseverance and dedicated service while providing care to patients, working in resource denied communities, and leading critical emergency responses in 8 countries throughout the COVID pandemic.

MEXICO LEADERSHIP PROGRAM PREPARING TO LAUNCH

With a new program coordinator and lots of design work with local HEAL alumni, HEAL community in Mexico is preparing to launch a monolingual Spanish local leadership cohort for nurses. This is part of HEAL's strategy to engage other health workers in HEAL transformation programming.



IN-PERSON TRAININGS RETURN



After two years of COVID precautions moving our in-person trainings into virtual spaces, our community of international health workers was finally together again. This year, HEAL held four regional gatherings with alumni and fellows. The new cohort of 2022-2024 fellows kicked off with a Global Health Intensive launching them into their two- year fellowship.

Connecting our transnational community of fellows once again showed how transformative in-person trainings are, by building skills and belonging for those doing difficult work in isolated places.


HEAL FELLOWS & ALUMNI

In 2022, our community has grown in numbers, in diversity professions, and in the places they work.



Expand to provide HEAL transformation programs to other health workers in the Global South and Navajo Nation.

Collaborate, advocate, and replicate HEAL across California, and impact policy nationwide.

IMMERSIVE TRAININGS

TRANSFORMING FELLOWS WHERE THEY WORK

In 2022, we held 2 multi-day virtual workshops for fellows across sites to build advocacy and leadership skills, 4 regional-based workshops, and 1 global health training for the international cohort 2022-2024 fellows to begin their program. These trainings were the first in-person offerings since 2019 due to the pandemic.

Regional workshops decentralize HEAL trainings, bringing community and curriculum proximate to where our fellows are.

Mexico

Compañeros en Salud our Chiapas-based partners hosted a 6-day training with workshops facilitated by HEAL alumni living and working in the region.



HEAL ACROSS THE CAMPUSES

COLLABORATING WITH UNIVERSITY OF CALIFORNIA

We are in the design phase of a California-wide program to better serve marginalized populations in California by partnering with UC Campuses. HEAL aims to increase training opportunities for Underrepresented Minorities in Medicine (URM) and build strong partnerships with community-based organizations and clinics.

2022 FINANCIALS

In keeping with UCSF, HEAL's fiscal year runs July 1- June 30. In this last fiscal year (July 1 2021-June 30, 2022), HEAL generated \$2.54 million for our program, \$1.8 million in rotating fellow revenue (68%), nearly \$800 thousand in philanthropy (30%).


Philanthropy includes important investments toward the growth of our Strategic Plan. To meet our full expenses of \$3.5 million, we pulled upon \$837 thousand of our reserve.

This past year as in all years, roughly half of our spending is directly for rotating fellow salaries and all fellow professional development scholarships.


HEAL spent \$280 thousand to deliver immersive trainings for our international community (8%), and \$1.2 million on all other program delivery to train and transform fellows and alumni (37%). Finally, HEAL invested \$247 thousand on our Strategy 2 and 3 programming in Navajo Nation and the Global South.

HEAL is nearly halfway through our next fiscal year with a higher budget of \$3.94 million (from \$3.5 million) to support our continued work. HEAL seeks to raise \$1 million to support our Strategic Plan, operations, and growth this year, and \$5 million through 2026.
